World Cup: a waste of money?

The 2022 World Cup is expected to pull in 5 bn viewers, it is an undoubtedly massive sports tournament. Qatar bribed FIFA \$880m to confirm the 2022 host. It is estimated that Qatar have spent \$220 bn on infrastructure for hosting the World Cup. So, do the benefits outweigh the costs? The most recent report shows that Qatar is expected to receive \$17 bn in revenues. With the financial costs exceeding the revenues in the short and medium terms, Qatar is hoping the publicity of the tournament can spread its national image around the world. However, these 'soft power' and long-term economic benefits are not favourable. Lack of safety regulations and extreme harsh working conditions have caused thousands of migrant workers to die and many were not paid for their labour. The blood-stained image has casted a dark shadow over Qatar, making the hosting of the World Cup a waste of time and resources
